Hello Satellite Beach residents, neighbors and friends,

Perceptions:

There is an old adage that “perception is reality.”
What is your perception of Satellite Beach?

On May 11, I had the privilege of hosting the most recent Town Hall meeting titled “Perceptions and Expectations.” As your elected representatives of Satellite Beach (including the Mayor & 4 Councilmen), it is crucial that we talk with you, listen to you, and get as much input as possible from you (the taxpayers). Your perspectives are important to guide us in the decision making process. Many citizens attended the meeting, as well as many of the City Department heads. A variety of topics were brought up and discussed.

I personally, through my employment and community involvement, speak with residents on a daily basis. We discuss many of the issues facing our city. One perception that has been suggested at a Council meeting is that residents don’t mind paying the highest millage rate in the county. My experience and feedback from residents suggests differently. We are quickly approaching the maximum tax rate (10 mils) allowed by the state. What happens when we reach this limit? Tough decisions need to be made sooner rather than later.

Some perceptions are acquired from false rumors. Have you heard the one about the City Council eliminating the fire department, police department, or the recreation department to meet the budget? Have you personally validated this perception? In no council meeting has this ever been considered. My perception is that a small tied-in group of individuals who have regularly attended council meetings over the last several years are opposed to any kind of change. Some people do not like change. “We have been doing things this way for 25 years” is often stated. In most cases, change is necessary for survival, but in a responsible way. This November, there will be two seats available on the council. I ask that you research the candidates and issues facing the city and make an informed decision of who will be representing you. Vote


for the candidate that is willing to make difficult decisions, who understands that the money required to operate our city is your money and you have a say. It is our responsibility to ensure that the money is wisely used.

The slow economy continues to cut into the tax base and affect our ability to fund city operational costs at their current levels. Budget issues are discussed at every council meeting. Please try to attend a meeting or send an E-mail with your expectations for the future of your city. As I stated in my campaign, almost two years ago, I will not vote to raise the millage rate or taxes during my tenure. I was the only council member voting against a rise in the millage rate last year and I voted against the fire assessment fee. In both cases, I was out voted by my co-council. It is important that we explore creative solutions to the financial shortfalls we are facing. It is going to take more than a bake sale, one of the suggestions that I have heard.

One of the projects that I have worked diligently on is recycling bins around the city. It is important that all of us do our part to recycle our waste. There are some bins set-up at the sports fields and some on the beach parks. Please use these bins to recycle your plastic water bottles and aluminum cans.

These carts have yellow lids and are the same as those that will be used for the single stream recycling program at our homes starting this summer. Please refer to the can lid to become familiar with all of the general trash that can be recycled. My hope is that all residents, young, old and in-between, will enthusiastically participate in this program. (There is no additional cost to you). If we recycle correctly, our general waste going into the landfill should be reduced by more than 50%.

As one of the newer members to council with opposing views and ideas, I am often outvoted four to one. This can be quite discouraging at times, however, I take my

Council Highlights

April 6, 2011, Regular Council Meeting

- Accepted the financial statements for the year ending September 30, 2010, as prepared by the City Auditor, Hoyman, Dobson & Company.
- Authorized the City Engineer to prepare preliminary technical information and a comprehensive watershed plan to prepare a Section 319 grant application for a Phase 1 Glenwood truck line project, with a maximum cost of \$5,000 to come from the stormwater utility fee.

May 24, 2011, Council Meeting

- Authorized the submission of a Section 319 Grant application to construct a stormwater system improvement in the Glenwood Truck Line/Lori Laine Drainage Basin, with a maximum total cost of \$853,000, of which the maximum City cost would be \$350,000 to come from the Stormwater Utility Fund. The remaining 60% would be provided through the Section 319 Nonpoint Source Management Grant Program.
- As part of the City's ongoing Green initiative, received PowerPoint presentations on a photovoltaic system lease option and the option of pursuing Leadership and Energy Environmental Design (LEED) certification for the David R. Schechter Community Center. Following presentation of the PowerPoint, City Council authorized staff to pursue a Silver certification for the Community Center. Both the photovoltaic lease option and LEED certification are being coordinated with the City's \$200,000 Florida Energy and Climate Grant. The grant will provide \$168,000 for energy efficiency renovations for the Civic Center/City Hall; \$8,500 in improvements to the Community Center HVAC chiller unit; and \$12,000 to conduct energy audits on City facilities.
- Authorized attendance of City Attorney at the Florida Municipal Attorney's annual seminar July 21-23.
- Appointments to Boards:
 - Reappointed Mike Hensley as a regular member of the Recreation Board.

Conserving is Saving: Start at Home!

Greetings to you once again, residents and businesses of Satellite Beach. In this edition of the *Beachcaster* we will be discussing simple, common sense ways that you can make your homes more water and energy efficient, and subsequently, easier on your pocket book by way of reduced utility bills. But first, you should know that by the time of this article's printing, the City will have completed the second phase of energy efficiency audit evaluations of various City buildings. This is the next step toward making these facilities more environmentally friendly, while at the same time becoming more pleasant places to work and visit, and less costly to operate. This is all part of the energy grant that the City was awarded, which was described in the previous installment of this series. You will be provided with a detailed update on this important project in a future edition of the *Beachcaster*.

Now, let's talk about some ways that you can make your home more efficient and economical. One of the most productive things to do is a home energy and water use evaluation. Both Florida Power & Light (FPL) and St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD) offer free methods for you to evaluate your home's energy and water usage. You can find FPL's "Online Home Energy Survey" at: http://www.fpl.com/residential/energy_saving_programs/ohes.shtml. Similarly, SJRWMD's "Home Water Use Survey" can be located at: <http://www.sjrwmd.com/waterconservation/survey.html>. These are extremely useful tools to help you identify where you are using the most energy and water, and thus the areas that would be most productive for you to address for potential savings.

After completing a home energy evaluation, it is a good idea to give your home a thorough inspection to see if you can identify areas that need repair or that can be improved upon. Finding an area that needs improvement, even if you aren't able to address it immediately, will help you plan for the future. Here are some common things to look for around the house that could be wasting money:

- Check your air handler air filter monthly. If it is dirty, replace it to restore proper air flow and efficiency. Up to 50% of flow can be blocked by a plugged filter, which means you're missing out on 50% of your air conditioner's efficiency.

- Check the condition of weather stripping and caulking. Air leaks can increase heating or cooling costs from 20% to 50%. The most likely places to identify leaks are around windows and doors, or where plumbing pipes, light fixtures, cables, or vents penetrate walls.

- Make sure your air conditioning condenser unit is clear of grass, leaves, or other obstructions. Restrictions to air flow will make it work harder and use more energy. Make sure the interior air induction grill is also clear of obstructions.

- Check hot water heaters. In the morning before any usage, both hot and cold pipes should be about the same temperature. If one is hotter than the other, it's possible you have a hot water leak somewhere.

- Check for air duct leaks. Ducts are usually located in a crawl space, attic, and your utility closet. Also check for leaks around the air return box of your air handler.

- Check the condition and quality of your home's insulation in your attic or crawl space. Chances are, if your house was built before 1980, you would do well with more insulation.

As you can see, there are many areas around the house that might be costing you more money than is necessary. After optimizing your home's current configuration, it is also a good idea to keep efficiency in mind when replacing household items. When you need to replace incandescent light bulbs, look into compact fluorescent or LED units, which on average use about 75% less energy and last up to 10 times longer than traditional bulbs. If you're replacing a toilet, faucet or shower head, look into low-flow units, which can save a lot of water over the life of the unit. If you are replacing an air conditioner or appliance, check into high efficiency or Energy Star® rated units. Don't forget to look into potential rebates or incentives from your utility provider, as well, which can help you save even more. Also, watch for free efficiency items that are often given away at community events -- a great way to try them.



All of these are examples of easy to use home conservation items that were obtained free by attending various local community events in the Space Coast. There is a dish cleaning squeegee, a DVD with water and electricity savings tips, a toilet fill cycle meter, a half gallon per minute sink aerator, a rain water gauge for the lawn, and a compact fluorescent light bulb.



Following is a list of tips that you can apply at your own home to help you conserve and save!

TOP 10 ENERGY SAVINGS TIPS

Listed below are 10 easy measures that FPL has identified that can save you money by reducing your energy usage. We encourage you to post these tips in your home so they can serve as helpful reminders of the simplest ways for you to save!

1. Cool your home at 78 degrees or warmer with the thermostat fan switched to auto. For additional savings, raise your thermostat to 82 degrees or warmer when you're away.
2. Heat your home at 68 degrees or cooler with the thermostat fan switched to auto. To save even more, lower your thermostat to 65 degrees or cooler at night or when you're away from home.
3. Reduce your water heater temperature from 140 degrees to 120 degrees, which is the recommended temperature setting according to the U.S. Department of Energy, to save about \$7 a month.
4. Clean or replace the A/C filter regularly to help your unit run more efficiently and trim cooling costs.
5. Turn off your ceiling fan when you leave the room. A fan that runs all the time costs up to \$7 a month.
6. Use your dishwasher to conserve energy. Avoid pre-rinsing dishes to save up to \$70 a year.
7. Limit the time you run your pool pump:
 - Summer - six hours a day
 - Winter - four hours a day
8. Adjust the water level on your washing machine to match the load size, especially when using hot water. Always use a cold rinse.
9. Clean the lint filter in your dryer before every load to dry your clothes faster.
10. Use the auto sensor function on your dryer to conserve energy by not over-drying your clothes.

TOP 10 WATER SAVINGS TIPS

Listed below are 10 simple ways that we have identified for you to reduce your home water usage. Five indoor tips and five outdoor tips will help you conserve our limited supply of potable drinking water -- and save money at the same time.

Indoor

1. Check your toilet tank level when filled. It should be at least a half inch below the top of the overflow tube. Otherwise, water might be going right down the drain. Adjust accordingly.
2. Check for toilet leaks. Put a few drops of food coloring in your toilet tank when full. If you see color in the bowl without flushing after 30 minutes, you probably have a leak at or around the flapper valve.
3. Avoid unnecessary toilet flushes. Dispose of tissues and other waste in the trash.
4. Repair dripping faucets. Replace washers or install low flow aerators to further reduce usage. One leaked drop per second wastes about 2,700 gallons of water annually.
5. Turn off the faucet whilst brushing your teeth or shaving. Likewise, turn off the shower water while you lather.

Outdoor

1. Don't water between 10:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m., as you will be losing unnecessary water to evaporation.
2. Water early in the morning. Sprinklers can wash accumulated dew off grass, giving up to an extra 1/10 of an inch of water.
3. Correct and adjust the aim of your sprinklers to minimize overspray on hardscape.
4. Use a rain meter on your lawn so that you're reminded not to water after receiving at least a half inch of rain.
5. Collect rain water runoff in containers to use for irrigation. It's easy and free!

The information for these tips was gathered from various local sources, including Florida Power & Light, St. Johns River Water Management District, Orlando Utilities Commission, and South Florida Water Management District.

CITY ELECTION November 8, 2011

A City election will be held on **TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2011**, for the purpose of electing **TWO** Council Members. Vice-Mayor Mike Chase and Councilman Jeffrey Fleis are completing their first term and are eligible to seek re-election.

The Council consists of four members and a mayor who are elected at large in a non-partisan election. A candidate must be a registered voter and have been a resident of the City for at least one year prior to the date of qualifying for office. The Mayor and Council Members serve without salary. They may serve two consecutive three-year terms, and then must wait at least one year before they are eligible to serve again.

The *Candidate and Campaign Treasurer Handbook* will be available in the City Clerk's Office by July 15. Anyone interested in running for Council must **first** appoint a campaign treasurer and designate a campaign depository. These two steps must be completed and filed with the City Clerk **before** opening a campaign account, receiving contributions, or making expenditures. The bank will require a copy of this document.

In order to be included on the November ballot, candidates must file the necessary papers in the City Clerk's Office between **August 11 and August 24, 2011**. To vote in the **November 8, 2011, election**, submit the form by **Monday, October 10, 2011**.

Prepare for the Hurricane Season

Hurricane season is here. We must all prepare for the wind and rain. Eliminate potential problems by:

- Trimming dead branches and palm fronds from trees prior to announcement of an impending storm event to prevent possible flying debris. Don't wait until a storm event has been announced, as it is too late to expect collection of curbside yard waste.
- Keep storm drain inlets clear of litter and yard waste. Don't place recycling or yard waste for pick-up on top of inlets. Foreign matter in storm drains could cause blockage and potential flooding.
- Secure all trash and recycling containers and their contents to help deter flying debris.

Spotlight on Satellite Beach Businesses

The February event was well attended with thirty-five Satellite Beach businesses participating in the event to feature our business community. Sprinkler Systems



Driving along the streets of Satellite Beach one sure notices all the well-kept lawns and landscaping. But wait -- didn't we just have three days of rain? What are all these sprinklers doing on? We all have seen that!

Councilman Scott Rhodes, City Council Liaison to the Beautification Board, tells us that a rain sensor can be installed for about \$100, and it would eliminate the sprinklers from coming on after a sufficient rainfall.

We all have our own wells, and we want to keep Satellite Beach landscapes looking great for years to come. To do that, we need to conserve so we have sufficient water left in the aquifer.

It occurred to the Beautification Board that, perhaps, there may be elderly residents who may not be able to change their timers to agree with the new two-day watering guidelines from the St. John's River Water Management District.

If you are over 65, and would like to have your sprinkler timer reset, please call Chairwoman Judie Kraemer of the Beautification Board at 773-5450.

Free Gun Locks

Satellite Beach Police Department, working in cooperation with the National Shooting Sports Foundation, will provide City residents, or gun owners with children in Satellite Beach schools, free gun locks and gun safety literature as part of Project ChildSafe.

Project ChildSafe is a nationwide program whose purpose is to promote safe firearms handling and storage practices among all firearms owners through the distribution of key safety education pamphlets and free gun locking devices. The program is supported by the United States Department of Justice.

The Police Department has obtained 200 gun safety kits through Project ChildSafe. These kits will be made available to any City resident or gun owners with children attending Satellite Beach schools, no questions asked and free of charge.

We encourage all gun owners to store weapons in a location that is inaccessible to children, regardless of age, with ammunition stored in a separate location. Our School Resource Officers will continue to educate the children in our community on gun safety topics. Anyone interested in receiving a free kit can stop by the lobby of the Police Department any time.

Banana River Sail and Power Squadron is offering the following courses:

◆ **Seamanship Course** – June 29, 6:30-8:30 p.m., at Keiser University, northwest corner of Babcock and Nasa, in Melbourne. North Drainage Outfall Project Begins

Construction began May 31 on the project known as the North Drainage Outfall. This project will replace the dilapidated corrugated metal pipe that is currently in place between the former PAFB South Housing Area and South Patrick Park subdivision to the north and the School Board, Villa Sienna, and other properties to the south.

This drainage system currently outfalls into the drainage culvert under SR 513 and eventually into the Grand Canal via the stormwater system in place between the South Waterway subdivision and the Emerald Isles subdivision.

The new system will re-route the stormwater from the old system to pipes that will cross under SR 513 and ultimately terminate at the Chevy Chase canal, where a new outfall will be installed. Two nutrient separating baffle boxes will be installed in the road on Chevy Chase Boulevard to treat the stormwater prior to it reaching the canal.

Residents will be notified well in advance of any construction affecting their immediate areas.

The contractor, Masci Corporation of Port Orange, was awarded the bid in the amount of \$1,112,052, and anticipates starting construction at the east end of the project limit. The allotted contract time is 180 days. During construction, a Satellite Beach Public Works representative will be present to address any concerns by residents, stakeholders, or the contractor.

All work will be performed inside of the drainage easement. However, there may be times when it will be necessary to temporarily encroach on private property. In those instances, there will be advanced coordination with those affected.

Where applicable, any privately owned fences, vegetation, or irrigation systems presently located in the easement will be relocated inside the property line. Affected residents will be notified in advance so that proper arrangements can be made.

This project was funded by a FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant, which will pay 75% of the costs. In accordance with an interlocal agreement, the remaining 25% will be divided between the City, Brevard County, and the Brevard County School Board.

Code Corner

Grass Clippings Are a Particular Problem


No dumping in the channels, ditches, canals, or storm drains, or the house you flood may be your own!

Dumping in any watercourse, canal, or ditch is a violation of the Satellite Beach City Code.

Many lawn maintenance companies dump or blow grass clippings into the street and/or storm drains. The accumulation of grass clippings can cause plugging within the system and also contributes to the level of chemicals (fertilizers) within the City’s stormwater discharge.

A plugged waterway cannot carry water and, when it rains, the water has to go somewhere. Every piece of trash contributes to flooding. If your property is next to a waterway, please do your part and keep the banks clear of brush and debris.

Leave Fireworks to Professionals


